## Beta Lambda Named the Most Improved Chapter in Kappa Psi

At the 53<sup>rd</sup> GCC, the brothers of Beta Lambda from the University of Toledo was presented the William R. Smith Most Improved Chapter Award for 2007, meaning that they had the greatest increase in points on the Chapter of the Year Form between 2006 and 2007. Right now, Beta Lambda has 22 active brothers and 8 pledges, and you may remember them as the host chapter of the 2007 Province V Midyear Meeting in October. How does a small chapter like this become so successful?

It starts with choosing good pledges and developing great brothers! At Beta Lambda, rush starts third week Fall semester, as in accordance with the college policy. A cookout with LKS kick starts pledging. To help build teamwork amongst the pledges, the chapter has an active versus pledges football game. This is followed a few weeks later with a co-ed football game with LKS against our rival fraternity AZO. During the course of pledging, weekly pledge meetings are held to give them all of the necessary Kappa Psi information and direct them as to how to be a good brother. Pledging wraps up two



weeks before finals start, usually the first weekend on December. Beta Lambda does a great job of including pledges in all events throughout the semester, which usually involves something every weekend. This is all summed up with an activation dinner at Tony Packo's or the Spaghetti Warehouse with new brothers the day after second degree and immediately following the initiation ritual.

The brothers of Beta Lambda take pride in their philanthropic work. They annually participate in the Race for the Cure, Relay for Life and a Project HOPE fundraiser (an organization to help women). Make-a-Wish is a big part of the chapter too, including *(continued on page 8)*

clear cups that contain beer or other obviously alcoholic beverage), sexist photos, overtly sexual materials, obscene gestures, obscene attire, racism, obviously intoxicated individuals, illegal activities or illegal paraphernalia. Any chapter that includes anything questionable will not be eligible for the Best Presentation Award and may be subject to disciplinary action.

For the past couple of years, Province V has focused its philanthropy efforts on the area of pediatrics. Events such as Special Olympics, Brown-Bag visits, and Pediatrics Ward visits are just some of the ways that the Province has promoted its philanthropy focus. Up to this point, there really has not been a focus from the Province on a specific pediatric philanthropy project. So why not select a focus?

One of the ideas that has been in the mix, both at National and Province levels, has been the Ronald McDonald House. The mission statement of the Ronald McDonald House Charities (RMHC) is to create, find and support programs that directly improve the health and well-being of children. RMHC fulfills its mission by creating innovative and effective programs that address targeted needs, and supports the programs and other activities conducted by its' local Chapters worldwide. RMHC also awards grants to other non-profit children's organizations that have a positive impact on the health and well-being of children around the world.



The Ronald McDonald House has affiliate Chapters in all of the states that Province V Chapters are located. This would be an excellent way to show other Provinces the unity that Province V has in terms of a central focus in philanthropy. At a National level, the Ronald McDonald House

may be chosen as a focus for the National Philanthropy Project. But the Ronald McDonald House isn't the only option that the Province has. This is just an idea so that the Province is able to head in the right direction once we come together at Assembly.

The point of this article is not to impose the Ronald McDonald House onto the Province, but rather to start the Province thinking of selecting a focus for our philanthropy. Pediatrics gives the Chapters an extensive variety of options to be able to fulfill their philanthropy efforts. This is a key reason that many people do not want to change the philanthropy project from pediatrics. However, keep in mind, our Province can make a huge impact on one charity if we focused all our efforts. Sometimes it is refreshing to change, and I think that a focus such as the Ronald McDonald House could help bring that about. Hopefully we'll find out at Assembly!

## New Chapters: The Process Explained

With eight new or re-activated chapters in a ten-month period from November 2006 to last August (seven of the graduate variety), the topic of conversation around the Kappa Psi water cooler these days is expansion. Kappa Psi boldly aims to spread its brotherhood and high ideals around the world with the fortunate knowledge that our greatest assets are without limits. Noted American author and environmental advocate Edward Abbey once quipped, "*Growth for the sake of growth is the ideology of the cancer cell.*" Abbey likely was not a fan of the cliché, "*If you're not doing something, you're doing nothing.*" Fortunately, our leadership is full-steam-ahead at doing a whole lot of something, and like following in the Magellan's wake, we should be supremely thankful to have such visionaries blazing our path! For a Fraternity that has initiated nearly 80,000 people, having only fifty active graduate chapters seems starkly minimal. But with a little effort, that number should soar well into the hundreds in the coming years.

In this spirit, countless inquiries have been flooding through mailboxes around North America about how y'all can best lend assistance to this epic task. As Chaplain, my

purpose is to oversee our rituals and props, and perhaps to be a resource on our Constitution and policies. Plus, having been recently successful in navigating the complexities of re-activating a graduate chapter, I have a slight bit of insight on the matter. So I'd like to dedicate this column to explaining how to create a new or re-activating dormant chapters and helping to get the ball rolling on an organizational meeting in your area! With Thanksgiving fresh in our minds, remember that there is always room for seconds. Like baseball teams in New York, do not let the presence of an existing graduate chapter in your area deter you from starting another, as large chapters can often become unwieldy or the commute across a vast metro area too cumbersome. This can only help to further our Fraternity development.

By-Law IV (Chapters) in the By-Laws section of the Kappa Psi Constitution very clearly lays out the constitutional process for chartering a new chapter of Kappa Psi. It is interesting to note that there is no difference between chartering a new collegiate or a new graduate chapter. The process is identical. In addition, the Central Office issued a memo on the process of chartering a new chapter about thirteen months ago, which is available on the Kappa Psi International Website. 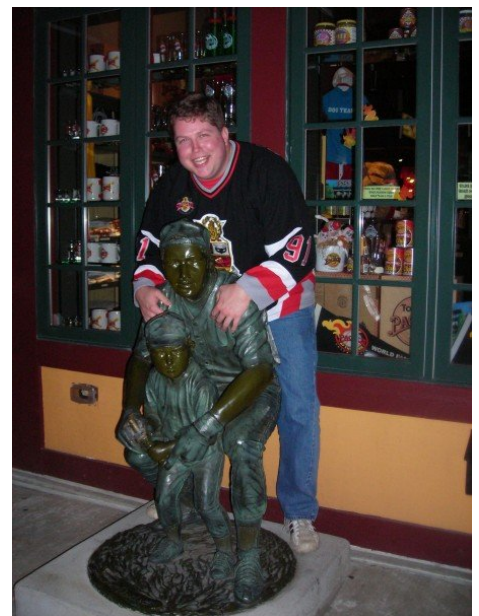

word “dormant” does not appear in our Constitution, leaving the exact process of re-activation of a long-dormant chapter open to the interpretation. However, often times a long-dormant chapter will follow an abbreviated version of the same process as a newly proposed chapter, though this is not always the case, and votes of the Executive Committee or the Grand Council can seem to amend this process as necessary.

Traditionally, the first step is a series of organizational meetings in the area or at the school of pharmacy for the proposed chapter. For collegiate chapters, obvious etiquette suggests that a student, group of students, or the administration should issue an invitation to a brother or officer of Kappa Psi before that person goes to speak at a school of pharmacy. If a group of students expresses interest in starting a chapter at a school and with the blessing of the administration, brother(s) of Kappa Psi should be found who can oversee a rush and pledge period and help guide the students through the chapter organizational process. An important note is that no collegiate can be initiated into a proposed chapter until the chapter has been chartered. Initiation of the new collegiates is concurrent with the new chapter installation. For graduate chapters, interested graduate brothers can contact the Central Office for a list of brothers’ names in the area and cross-reference that list with alumni association info from a local pharmacy school or state pharmacy board information, to try to establish contact with a group of other interested graduate brothers in your area. The length of time that the series of organizational meetings should be conducted over is not specified, though a period of at least three months to a year is common. For both proposed collegiate and graduate chapters, it is permissible and often helpful to elect provisional officers during the “organizational meetings” stage.

The next step is to submit to the Central Office an “Application for a Chapter Charter”. There is no formal written application form, so there is no need to contact the Central Office for such a form. This “application for a chapter charter” is essentially a simple hard copy letter, mailed to the Central Office via postal mail, stating the interest by this organizational group to charter the proposed chapter and signed by the brothers. The letter must be signed by a minimum of five graduate brothers of Kappa Psi who “reside in the district” of the

proposed chapter and who would support the new chapter. Even proposed collegiate chapters need five grads to sign the application letter, and there is no definition for the boundaries of the “district”. It seems unlikely any chapter application would be denied due to a signatory residing too far away, but some attention needs to be paid to this matter.

The organizational group must draft a set of local ordinances to be added as By-Law XVII to the Uniform Collegiate Chapter By-Laws or the Uniform Graduate Chapter By-Laws for the proposed Chapter. The Uniform By-Laws may be used as an example and starting point for preparing these local ordinances. It is recommended that the group consult the Constitution and Local Ordinances page on the Kappa Psi International Website for an electronic copy of other chapters’ local ordinances, which may be used as an example or starting point for the group.

Once drafted, the new local ordinances must be submitted to the Central Office in both an electronic copy (Microsoft Word preferred) and a hardcopy. The Central Office will forward these to the Grand Counselor for review and approval. The Grand Counselor often times will defer to the opinion of the national Legislative Committee (appointed by the Grand Regent) if there is anything of a questionable nature contained in the new local ordinances. Upon approval by the Grand Counselor of the new local ordinances, the Executive Committee must vote on approval of the proposed Chapter, with a three-fourths (3/4) assenting vote required for establishment of the new Chapter. An obvious but important note here is that the Constitution does not automatically grant a charter if the chartering steps are followed, and that a super-majority vote of the Executive Committee is required for approval of the new chapter.

Finally, upon approval of the chapter by three-fourths of the Executive Committee, the organizational group shall pay a chartering fee of two-hundred (\$200.00) U.S. dollars to the Central Office. For new chapters, the group will then work with the Grand Regent and the Central Office to establish a date and time amenable to both for the installation of the new chapter and officers. The charter for the new chapter is printed by the Central Office and delivered to the chapter at the time of installation by an official representing the Fraternity, which is commonly a grand officer. For re-activations of long-dormant chapters, a fee of two-hundred (\$200.00) U.S. dollars is common, though the group needs to contact the Central Office for exact details. This fee typically covers back dues owed by the chapter.

If anyone has questions on the process outlined above, please contact the Executive Director or an Executive Committee member. Have a happy and safe holiday season!

## Jenny Donaldson (continued)

Jenny was initiated into the Beta Upsilon chapter at Butler University in 1988. As a commuter student at Butler, she felt she didn't have much of a connection with the campus, so pledging Kappa Psi was a way to strengthen that, at least within the college of pharmacy. Her class was the first to be offered the option of the PharmD program, so while she considers pledging Kappa Psi to be her best decision in pharmacy school, going through the PharmD program was her second best decision in pharmacy school. She feels this was a direct result of being a Kappa Psi brother.

During her time in Beta Upsilon, she served as the regent, and later went on to serve the fraternity as the Province V Secretary-Treasurer, as well as Supervisor for Provinces VII and IX. When asked which was her favorite Province V meeting, Jenny says that when she was finally elected to the Province V Executive Committee, it was just the right time, and she had the right focus and energy to give to the office. However, she can't just choose one overall favorite Kappa Psi memory! "Oh, there are so many, and some I wish to forget! Just anytime sitting with brothers, and we are talking about whatever... and the laughs just come so loud and hard my belly starts to hurt and I start to cry! With the fraternity, there is a different tweak of the professional-friendship bond. We share a little more than other friendships."

As a Kappa Psi brother, Jenny has spent a lot of time traveling around the country (and abroad) with other brothers. Her favorite GCC was Jackson Hole, Wyoming in 1991. She was still in school, and with three other brothers, she drove all the way to Wyoming! Jenny was able to meet and hang out with so many people, and feels she was young enough to have fun and not get caught up in the politics that year. Without naming names, there are several brothers she has met all over this country that have had personal tragedies. "These indi-

viduals have worked through the problem, and sometimes it is that other brothers have been there for support. Sometimes the brother has to draw away from the fraternity for awhile, but then they come back as a better person. I think we can all learn from the real life experiences that our brothers have gone through".

Jenny Donaldson should be admired for her dedication to Kappa Psi, and especially to Province V. What other brother has attended over 30 Province V meetings? So, what does Jenny think is the key to longevity of involvement in Kappa Psi? She thinks a brother should be willing to give what they can, and everyone needs to be realistic about the expectations. For example, a graduate brother may only be able to participate at the local level. Great... make that the best

Grad Chapter you can! A brother may not be able to go to GCC, but they could sponsor a collegiate. A brother may not be able to run for the international executive committee, but they can present a CE, be a delegate, be a local GCD. Whatever a brother chooses, they should choose wisely and give it their all. In fact, this is Jenny's best advice for collegiate brothers: You get out of the fraternity what you put into it.

So the next time you are at a Province V meeting, and you see Jenny Donaldson, make sure to introduce yourself and get to know this dedicated graduate brother.

usually 4 or more philanthropy events with them annually, including sports auction that raises over \$50,000 dollars every year to help make kids wishes come true. Since every college student eats or drinks something out of a can, brothers collect pop-tabs throughout the year within the college and donate them to the Ronald McDonald house (last year we raised over 17,000). This year, Beta Lambda is looking forward to working with a local nursing home in planning activities for seniors, and increasing their work with Ronald McDonald House.

Socially, Beta Lambda has a variety of events. The biggest social event of the year is the famous Halloween party where normally around 300 show up, including some of the faculty. Occasionally, they go to local comedy clubs with LKS for a fun evening on the town. Brothers also participate in the AZO bowl-a-thon which is a purely social event for the College. In the Spring, there is an annual Alumni event called Stag (other alumni and brothers are

more than welcome to come). This is always a great time to catch up with brothers as far back as graduates from 1949! Beta Lambda also helps out the college with the Pharmacy Phield day (an afternoon to unwind and relax with other students) by providing cornhole boards for the cornhole tournament.

Beta Lambda is a fairly unique chapter, since they are still exclusively male, which works well at the University of Toledo. One thing that Beta Lambda excels in is academics. This is in part due to the fact that the college mandates a 3.0 grade point average for all students in the PharmD. track, although many brothers have around a 3.5 or higher. Brotherhood is another thing Beta Lambda takes pride in. As an all male chapter with membership usually in the 20s, they are all very close and know each other very well. According to past Regent, Eric Geyer, "We feel that this is a key cornerstone to a fraternity and although we have our fun, being able to take the time to know all your chapter brothers well is the basis of a fraternal organization." Congratulations to all your success, Beta Lambda!
